### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

We being an affiliated college do not have any authority to change the curriculum. However, several teachers are a part of syllabus forming and restructuring it at the University level.

### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- The annual Teaching Plan is made by the teachers in the beginning of the academic year.
- Academic Calendar is also prepared by the college and Department. Teaching is done in innovative ways wherever possible.
- The faculties also undergo faculty Development Programmes and return updated, ready to render their learning to the students.
- The university and internal exams are also taken regularly. Several other activities between the teacher and the students create a good rapport in the institution. This makes a healthy environment.

### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- The University sends us the examination schedule and the college plans accordingly.
- The internal exams are taken by the faculties.
- There is central evaluation programme undertaken by the university which is followed by the faculties.

### 6.3.4 Research and Development

- The institution encourages the faculties to publish research papers and submit MRP proposals.
- The faculties sit after the teaching hours and work on it consequently. We see the increase in publications and research work.

### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- The library is well established with a lakh + books.
- It is open for the students on regular days from 10.30 am to 5.30 pm and during exam time from 8.30 am to 7.30 pm. They enjoy reading newspapers as there are newspapers available in Hindi, Marathi, Urdu, Kannada and English.
- The new arrivals are displayed in a very visible place. There is transaction of nearly 500 books everyday. There is a library committee which meets twice a year.

### 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The management of the institution, being highly qualified, recruit well-qualified staff. The quality of the staff is further enhanced by encouraging them to undergo research and publications. This has very positive impact on the faculty and staff. The self appraisal form is also duly filled by the faculties making them aware of their strengths and weaknesses. The Principal unceasingly takes an oral feedback of the students regarding all the matters. The students also are given ample support and encouragement for their progression according to their eligibilities.

#### **Best Practice-I**

Title of the Practice: Adoption of Village for Cleanliness, Health and Eco friendly Environment

### Goal:

- To initiate an intense cleanliness drive to maintain health and hygiene of the village
- To make the villagers of 'Hangarga' aware of the sanitation problems.
- To help the villagers curb the diseases caused owing to lack of sanitary facilities
- To initiate the villagers to construct toilets and use them
- To make the villagers aware of the government schemes to help them financially to
- To make them aware of the health issues by organizing a health camp especially for
- To make the students aware of the social realities

### The Context:

The concept of adopting a village is an excellent recurring practice of the college. It has been going on very consistently since the inception of the NSS unit of the college. Since years, the student volunteers have been taking this magnificent experience of attending the special NSS camp in the adopted village and learning to live with the realities of life. The adopted village, Chimachiwadi, at the end of three years, was the recipient of several prizes like Rashtriya Nirmal Gram Puraskar given at the auspicious hands of the President owing to the initiatives taken by the NSS unit of the College.

Last year, the village 'Hangarga' was adopted by the NSS unit of our college. The population of this village is 1400 people only. The village is located in a remote area where there is no access to government transport. There are neither doctors nor any government aid practitioners. No medical shop is in the reach of the villagers. In such a village dire need was felt by the college to adopt the village and initiate it for the betterment.

To take an initiative in such a village is indeed challenging. Before finalizing the dates of the NSS Special Camp, the unit Program Officers visit the village to get a tentative idea of the work to be done in the village. If the program officers think the village to be suitable and challenging, they proceed to plan accordingly. Soon, with the help of the Management member, NSS Program Officer and the Village-Chief, a

resolution is taken regarding the dates. The strategy of adoption is to elevate the face of the village at all levels.

#### The Practice:

Every year the NSS Programme Officers and the enrolled NSS students go for a camp in addition to the several other events taken throughout the year. At the beginning of the year students who are interested fill the form and enrol themselves as NSS members. They are briefed about the benefits of being NSS volunteers and the type of work to be done. The university has declared 10 marks for the NSS volunteers at the end of the degree course for the students who donate blood.

Before the commencement of the camp, the weeks' plan is printed in the form of pamphlet. The work is usually physical in the morning hours till lunch. The students have to get up early in the morning at 5 for their Yoga practice. After yoga, they undertake cleanliness drive of the village up to 9.00 a.m. They are served breakfast till 10.30 after they get fresh. Soon they set in motion with the days' work in batches for their digging work. It is as good as a competition among them with a group leader assigned to each group. At 2.00 p.m. they take their lunch and take a break till 3.00. From 3.00 p.m to 6.00 p.m. they have intellectual sessions/ women's health camp followed by a cultural programme ending with a combined dinner at night.

The very first day the students take a survey of the village and immediately understand their work. They see that streams of waste water emerging from all the houses and at the end forming a dirty puddle. Not only this but the students also see children playing in that waste water puddle and soon decide to take an initiative to dig soak pits. The work starts. The program officer divides them in groups to dig soak pits. Students take the essential equipment and start digging. They dig the pits of the size 5X 5 ft. In this way students dig 67 to 70 soak pits.

Initially, the villagers were not ready but our students convinced them from all the perspectives and got it done. They had another reason to get convinced. There was a government scheme for the villagers. If they dig the pits and take a photograph of it, they would get a financial help between 7 and 9 thousand to construct a toilet. Gradually, the villagers also started extending their cooperation through their hospitality. The villagers were very pleased with the selfless work the youngsters were doing. Their hands were not habituated to doing so hard work but this work made them happy.

The volunteers also organised a Women's Health Camp persuading all the women to test their haemoglobin as well their General Health Check up was also done.

#### Evidence of success:

The youngsters are vibrant with energy. They work as catalysts to erect toilets and soak pits. In all, 67 to 70 soak pits of 5X5 ft were dug. Otherwise every soak pit would cost the owner minimum Rs. 3000/- which they got freely done from the student volunteers. The program officers could instil in them the seeds of social service which may turn out to be the beginning of being great social workers.

For the villagers too it was a matter of great pride as with the help of the students they could build toilets in their houses which otherwise was a distant dream for them. Proper sanitation and toilets have entirely lifted the face of the village. Their mentality also changed.

### Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

Initially no one was getting convinced regarding digging such a big soak pit in front of their houses. A lot of counselling had to be done. The students were initially hesitant regarding their capability of digging so big pits. They had never done such a work before as most of them were First Year degree students. Social service was not their cup of tea till HSC. So, they too had to be boosted up.

Hangarga being an inaccessible village regarding transport anything needed took a lot of efforts. The electricity supply was also a big problem. But the village chief and the program officers took care to request the MSEB Office. Despite all these problems, our students could dig so many soak pits and saved the villagers' one lakh fifty thousand amount and assisted the villagers. It was an impressive accomplishment.

# Iftar Party for Social Harmony

#### Goal:

- To establish social integration and communal harmony
- To know the concept of Roza and its Objectives
- To respect the teachings of Islam and respect it

#### The Context:

The College has always been like a melting pot where several cultures merge among the students. Our college has got a good strength of all the religions. Muslim boys and girls have a vital role to play in the college premises.

Almost all the festivals are celebrated in the college in some or the other form. Ganesh Chaturthi is observed by installing the image of Ganesh for a week. In the same way Makarsankranti is also celebrated by one and all by exchanging *Tilgul*. Dassehera is also celebrated by exchanging sona i.e. auspicious leaves of Bahunia tree or Camels foot tree. Dr. B.R. Ambedkar's birth anniversary is honoured by organizing an exhibition in the library of all the books written by Dr. B.R. Ambedkar or books written regarding his life, philosophy etc.

Keeping in mind all these special days, Iftar Party is arranged during the days of Fast(Roza) of the Muslim people in the month of Ramzan.

#### The Practice

For the last more than forty years *Iftar Party* is arranged for all the students as well as teachers. The party is arranged during evening hours as the Muslims end their fast only in the evening at the fixed time. The programme commences one and a quarter hour before the *Iftar* time. In the programme all the NSS students, teachers and non teaching staff are present.

Eminent speakers like Mr. Javed Khan from Aurangabad, Prof. Haqqani and Prof. Mujeeb are invited to have a word on the occasion. The guests speak for 30 to

40 minutes furnishing the listeners with the niceties of the fast and Ramzan. The students sitting in front are a blended group and so all are benefited by the speech. This also makes the environment of the college prejudice free from the constraints of the Muslim culture.

The Muslim students are asked to sit comfortably as they are on fast since morning. After the function is over, dry fruits and fresh fruits are dished up to all of them.

Not only this, but holy books are also distributed among the Hindu audience so that they can go through the principles of the Muslim culture. The entire programme takes place till late in the evening. Despite this, the attendance of the boys and girls always remains high.

#### **Evidence of Success:**

The *Iftar Party* has to be arranged in the evening. There is no preference regarding timings. Despite this, a good number of students grace the function with their presence. After the Iftar party, the Muslim students pay the Namaz of Maghrib for which the Hindu students make the arrangements.

The girls also attend it without hesitation. The fruits are very willingly served by the students. In fact, they are the ones who purchase it, cut into pieces, and serve it. The guest speaker too is amazed at the amicable communication and the coordination among the teachers and students. The aftermath of this occasion is rendering value education and communal harmony among the students without any conflict. The whole function at the end turns out to be a splendid event in the face of the place being highly sensitive.
