The annual Teaching Plan is made by the teachers in the beginning of the academic year. Academic Calendar is also prepared by the college and Department. Teaching is done in innovative ways wherever possible. The faculties also undergo faculty Development Programmes and return updated, ready to render their learning to the students. The university and internal exams are also taken regularly. Several other activities between the teacher and the students create a good rapport in the institution. This makes a healthy environment.

# 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The University sends us the examination schedule and the college plans accordingly. The internal exams are taken by the faculties. There is central evaluation programme undertaken by the university which is followed by the faculties.

# 6.3.4 Research and Development

The institution encourages the faculties to publish research papers and submit MRP proposals. The faculties sit after the teaching hours and work on it consequently. We see the increase in publications and research work.
